Each year, one exceptional Club member is selected to be the National Youth of the Year. This person serves as an exemplary ambassador for Boys & Girls Club youth and as a strong voice for all of our nation's young people.

The journey to being named National Youth of the Year begins locally and progresses to the state, regional and national levels. To achieve the title of Youth of the Year on any level, Club members must embody the values of leadership and service, academic excellence, healthy lifestyles, and life and workforce readiness. They should exemplify the impact Boys & Girls Clubs have on the lives of young people.

This application kit is designed to be a resource and practice for preparing the YOY candidate as they work through the elements of the YOY application. The candidate's information contained in this kit will then need to be added into the YOY online application portal for judging at NYOY.org.

OVERVIEW

The Youth of the Year program creates opportunities for Club youth to receive recognition at the local, state, regional and national levels.

Club Level

A Youth of the Year is selected in the local Club from a pool of members who have participated in a yearround leadership and recognition program. The local Youth of the Year serves as a role model for other young people in the Club and as a representative to the community.

Organizational Level

In multi-unit organizations, only one finalist will be selected from Club-level candidates to represent the entire organization and advance to the state and successive levels.

State Level

Each candidate who advances to a state-level event must submit the application materials in this kit, in their entirety, to BGCA via the online application portal at <u>NYOY.org</u>. This is a one-time submission; materials from this kit will be reproduced for consideration at each successive level, should the candidate move on to regional and/or national participation.

Judges at the state, regional and national levels will consider candidates based on the scoring framework in this kit. For that reason, these application materials require candidates, and those who write letters of recommendation, to make a case for their qualification as BGCA's National Youth of the Year.

Regional Level

Candidates selected at the state level participate in their region's Youth of the Year event. No new application is required for participation at this level.

National Level

The five candidates named Regional Youth of the Year, along with the National Military Youth of the Year, will participate in a judging process to determine the National Youth of the Year.

TOP 5 TIPS FROM ALEJANDRA, 2023-2024 NATIONAL YOY:

1. Be proud of your story! Sharing your personal story is difficult and scary. It takes a lot of courage to do so. Participating in the YOY process allows you to be brave and let the world know who you are.

2. Know that everybody is your friend and mentor. Even though you will be coming into the YOY celebration with your local club staff and/or family, everybody who you meet along the way is part of this special group of people who care about you! It is comforting knowing how big the Boys and Girls Club family is and how much support they have for you!

3. Consider practicing your speech in front of nice

strangers! Speaking in front of large crowds can be scary, but the only way to get comfortable with it is by being uncomfortable. Nudge yourself to speak in situations you aren't familiar with.

4. Connect with other YOYs. Take advantage of the position you are in! How often do you have the chance to be around other like-minded youth from different parts of the nation? It is rare, and therefore soak in all the time you have next to these amazing youth by getting to know them!

5. Think of the interview process as a conversation. My main tip for being comfortable in interviews is by thinking of it as a conversation! It is simply an opportunity you have to showcase the amazing thing you have done, your passions, and the background that has shaped you to the person you are today.

SHARING YOUR STORY

Youth of the Year is an opportunity to share your Club's impact on your life and how the programs, staff, and experiences help shape who you are and your worldview.

Your story is worth sharing and hearing because it is your unique experience, and understanding how you became who you are today is the most essential part of this process.

Use strength-based messaging when you write and speak about your personal and Club experiences. Strength-based messaging supports positive youth development by allowing your words, stories and imagery to help inspire others to advocate for Boys & Girls Clubs and America's youth.

You have a unique story to tell, and Youth of the Year is an opportunity to share how your experience at the Club has shaped who you are and your worldview.

In your story, consider sharing the values that have shaped you and how the Club has helped you practice those values through leadership and service.


Use your words to paint a picture of how the Club and community has helped develop your strengths, build your confidence, and given you the platform to make a difference in your life and in the lives of others.

While you are encouraged to use your voice, you should only share what you are comfortable sharing. As you begin to write and share your story, consider using some of the questions below to help you:

Does my messaging...

- Give an overview of who I am?
- Explain what's important to me and why?
- Show how my Boys & Girls Club experience helped me become a leader in the community?
- Provide an understanding of why I'm positioned to advocate on behalf of America's youth?
- Share my experiences that are a motivation to advocate for something that I am passionate about?
- Empower and recognize?
- Center on youth voice?
- Focus on strengths of my community?

We want to learn about what empowered you to be the leader you are today and the issues that you care about. You should not feel pressured to share anything that you don't want to discuss. Remember, this is your story and your voice to use as you wish.



ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

Restrictions: Candidates previously named Regional Youth of the Year are not eligible to participate at the state, regional or national levels. Candidates can be named State Youth of the Year no more than two times. In multi-unit organizations, only one candidate (i.e., the Youth of the Year selected to represent the entire organization) may advance to the state and successive levels.

Application: Application submissions will only be accepted online at <u>NYOY.org</u>. Submissions must be received online on or before the due date. Online application submissions may not be altered once submitted.

Age: Candidates must be no younger than 14 and no older than 18 years of age on Jan. 31, 2025, to participate in the judging process at the state level.

Identification: Acceptable forms of identification include: state-issued driver's license or learner's permit, birth certificate, U.S. passport, Social Security card, military ID card, certificate of citizenship and naturalization, employment authorization number and Native American identification card. If candidates do not have one of these forms of ID, a school ID will be accepted. U.S. citizenship is NOT required.

We recognize that in some instances, a candidate's name may not match the name printed on their formal identification. BGCA supports all youth and is committed to providing an affirming and inclusive experience for everyone. Candidates may participate in all Youth of the Year activities, using the name they identify with, regardless of whether it matches the name on their formal ID. Staff will work with candidates and their advisors on a case-by-case basis, to ensure that all activities are safe and inclusive for everyone.

Status: Candidates advancing to the state level must have been named Youth of the Year for their organization during the current program year (Sept. 1, 2024, to Aug. 31, 2025). The organization's chief executive officer must sign and approve the candidate's application.


Attendance: Candidates must have active and continuing membership in a Boys & Girls Club or BGCA-affiliated Youth Center for one year prior to Jan. 31, 2025. Membership must be consecutive and may include more than one Club or organization.

Note: To ensure fidelity of the YOY program, BGCA may in future return to the pre-COVID attendance eligibility of at least 2 years of active and continuing membership.

Travel: Participation in state, regional and national YOY events will involve travel. If air travel is not feasible, BGCA will work with local Club staff to arrange alternate travel to BGCA-sponsored events.

Alumni Enrollment: All candidates who are juniors or seniors in high school must register for the Alumni & Friends Club at <u>BGCA.org/Alumni</u>. (Be sure they select the Club they attend when registering.)

Note: We recognize and support YOY candidates with disabilities. Please notify BGCA of any accommodation needs so we can assist accordingly. Each situation will be reviewed individually.



APPLICATION PROCESS

Who completes the application?

Clubs should assign a professional staff member to assist the candidate with the application process. Candidates should ensure all application materials are complete, professional looking and wellassembled.

How/when are applications submitted?

Application deadlines and event dates are determined by each state's host organization. When event dates are final, they are listed in the Youth of the Year application portal at <u>NYOY.org</u>. Applications should be completed in the YOY portal at least 30 days prior to the event date.

When completing the application in the YOY portal, you will use this YOY application kit as your guide as you enter the candidate's information, essays and upload the resume, cover letter, letters of recommendation and required forms. All application materials are outlined on the checklist (page 7).

Please remember: Only complete applications received by the application deadline will be reviewed and available to the judges for consideration.

What happens after submission?

After the deadline, all complete and approved applications will be reviewed by the judges in the YOY application portal.

During the judging process, the application packet will be considered along with the candidates' overall application quality, speeches and interviews at the event.

SCORING FRAMEWORK

The four weighted categories below will inform the judging process on the state, regional and national levels. Additional instructions for creating the best possible application are found throughout this document. Please reference the individual forms and sections for guidance. The Youth of the Year Leadership Development Suite (BGCA.net/page/YOY)) includes a preparation guide for candidates.

Candidates should consider identifying a platform that they are passionate about that contributes to the wellbeing of youth in Clubs and Youth Centers. In addition, this messaging should be consistent throughout their speech and essays. Candidates should focus their message on their character and leadership, service to others, and the impact they've had at their Club or Youth Center.

YOY SCORING RUBRIC

Essays (25%)

ESSAY 1 – CLUB EXPERIENCE (25%)

Clearly describes how they leveraged the Club experience to strengthen skills, build relationships and gain leadership experiences.

ESSAY 2 - WHAT MATTERS TO ME (25%)

Clearly conveys their interests, passions and/or issues of concern.

Describes their platform, including how they have or how they plan to put it into action.

ESSAY 3 – PERSONAL GROWTH (25%)

Clearly describes a period of personal growth, including what sparked it, what they learned, why it's important and they leveraged their strengths.

WRITING QUALITY (25%)

No grammar, spelling, or formatting errors. Writing is easy to follow and well organized.

Overall Application Quality (25%)

CLUB LETTER OF SUPPORT (30%)

Letter is from a Club professional who can attest to the candidate's Club experience.

Letter addresses the following in a compelling way:

- Character and values
- Leadership and service in the Club
- Potential for future leadership

COMMUNITY LETTER OF SUPPORT (30%)

Letter is from a community member who can attest to the candidate's leadership and service.

Letter addresses the following in a compelling way:

- Leadership skills
- Service in the community
- Potential for future leadership

APPLICATION MATERIALS (40%)

All application materials are present, well-organized and easy to follow.

Each application section is complete.

Public Speaking (25%)

SPEECH CONTENT (33%)

The speech conveys ALL of the following, while relating them to the candidate's essays:

- Strengths and leadership
- How they leveraged the Club experience for personal growth
- Plans for the future.

The flow is clear. It adheres closely to a story plot and includes a beginning, middle, and end.

DELIVERY & PRESENCE (33%)

Uses body language, stage movement and tone effectively to engage the audience.

TIMING (33%)

Adhered to the 3-minute time limit.

Interview (25%)

INTERVIEW CONTENT (50%)

Responses are complete and well thought-out.

Responses stay focused on the question at hand.

Makes explicit connections to the Club experience.

PRESENCE (50%)

Responses are articulated with confidence, humility and little hesitation.

Personality shines through the responses.

Uses body language, eye contact and handshake effectively to engage the panel.

JOB DESCRIPTION

A Youth of the Year (YOY) candidate embodies excellence in Boys & Girls Clubs of America's four priority outcome areas of Health and Well-Being, Character and Leadership, Academic Success, and Life and Workforce Readiness. Being named Youth of the Year is the highest honor bestowed upon Club members. The National Youth of the Year serves as a role model and spokesperson for America's youth. They educate millions of Americans about the power of the Club experience and elevate the national focus on key issues facing children and teens.

The National YOY is purpose-driven and aware of the challenges facing young people today. Under the direction of BGCA staff, Youth of the Year representatives will attend state, regional and national events. They will serve as thought leaders on key issues by telling their inspiring personal stories. Potential audiences include youth, alumni, members of the media, and political, corporate and community leaders. Youth of the Year representatives may be asked to appear on television, make remarks before public officials and speak at events where they can make a difference. State, regional and national YOYs will serve in this role for one year.

Commitments

The primary commitments include, but are not limited to, the following:

Public Speaking: Youth of the Year representatives deliver speeches – without the use of props, notes or other memory aids – at a variety of events. They will keep speeches updated in an electronic format and if requested, submit them to BGCA staff prior to events. BGCA staff will work with candidates and advisors on a case-by-case basis to ensure an inclusive space for everyone.

Event Participation: Youth of the Year representatives will attend BGCA-sponsored events. They may be asked to make remarks, answer questions, and engage guests in conversation. They must strive to remain responsive, courteous, and gracious. Appropriate business attire and punctuality are critical. State Youth of the Year are expected to participate in the Regional Youth of the Year event during the year they are named State Youth of the Year. Regional Youth of the Year are expected to participate in the National Youth of the Year event during the year they are named Regional Youth of the Year. Failure to participate in the successive events will result in the loss of the Youth of the Year title and scholarship awarded from the previous level of Youth of the Year.

Academic Achievement: Youth of the Year representatives must have a strong commitment to academic achievement and improvement throughout the year in which they hold the YOY title. State, Regional and National YOYs must maintain a 2.5 GPA to maintain their scholarships.

Leadership

Youth of the Year representatives demonstrate leadership skills in their interactions with others and in their communities. They create meaningful change and motivate and inspire others.

Self-Leadership: Youth of the Year representatives demonstrate self-awareness and understanding of personal values. They set goals and take action aligned with their personal values. They make choices that positively impact their lives. And they inspire others.

Leadership With Others: Youth of the Year representatives understand the value of different perspectives; use effective and inclusive communication practices to work together toward a shared goal; and collaborate by including diverse perspectives.

Leadership in the Community: Youth of the Year representatives continuously seek to understand community needs; listen to and engage with people with diverse perspectives; and use self-knowledge and collaboration to make transformative change in communities.

Qualifications

Youth Advocacy: Youth of the Year representatives should be able to speak up and/or take action for themselves and/or others to support a cause or purpose they believe in.

Knowledge of Boys & Girls Club Movement

Priorities: Youth of the Year representatives should have at least basic knowledge about current BGCA programming and events. They should be able to speak clearly about their Club Experience and the vital role the Club plays in providing opportunities for youth in their communities. They should be committed to leveraging the coaching and support of BGCA staff to become stronger in this area.

Communication: Youth of the Year representatives should possess strong verbal and written communication skills. They should be able to articulate the impact their Club Experience has had on their lives. They should feel comfortable and confident delivering prepared speeches and answering spontaneous questions. They should also demonstrate strong listening skills by listening with understanding when others are speaking and thoughtfully answering questions. Youth with disabilities can be supported in achieving these outcomes through reasonable accommodations.

Relational Ability: Youth of the Year representatives should demonstrate a high degree of relational ability by being able to appreciate diverse backgrounds and cultures, see the world from multiple perspectives and understand the value of these differences. They should be inclusive and able to effectively communicate and build relationships with others.

Character: Youth of the Year representatives are ambassadors for the Movement and youth around the world. They must emulate the highest standards of character, including trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness and caring.

- **Trustworthiness:** Honest in communications and actions; reliable; has the courage to do the right thing; loyal and keeps promises.
- Respect: Treats others with respect; tolerant and accepting of differences; considerate of others' feelings; peacefully resolves conflicts.
- Responsibility: Does what they say they will do; plans ahead; perseveres; does their best; uses self-regulation and self-discipline; accountable for words, actions and attitudes; sets a good example for others; and makes healthy choices.
- Fairness: Open-minded; listens to others; treats all people fairly.
- **Caring:** Kind; compassionate; shows empathy; expresses gratitude; charitable; helps others.
- **Citizenship:** Makes the world better; involved; volunteers; obeys laws and rules; respects authority.

Failing to maintain these standards could lead to the YOY being asked to relinquish their title and forfeit any scholarship dollars related to the YOY program.

Candidate Nomination Form

Resume and Cover Letter

Provide the candidate with the resume and cover letter instructions and available templates in this kit to help them prepare. Please do not include personal identifying information (e.g., home address, email, phone number) in the resume or cover letter. The resume and cover letter will be uploaded into the YOY online application portal.

Essays

Essay instructions are included in this kit. Candidates should compose their essays and copy/paste their essays into the YOY online application portal. The three required essays are:

- 1. My Club Experience
- 2. What Matters to Me
- 3. Personal Growth

Letters of Recommendation

Instructions are included in this kit. The two required letters of recommendation that will be uploaded into the YOY online application portal are:

- 1. Club Recommendation
- 2. Community Recommendation

Photocopy of ID

A copy of the candidate's ID will be uploaded into the YOY online application portal and can be one of the following forms of identification: stateissued driver's license or learner's permit, birth certificate, U.S. passport, Social Security card, military ID card, certificate of citizenship and naturalization, employment authorization number or Native American identification card. If candidates do not have one of these forms of ID, a school ID will be accepted. U.S. citizenship is NOT required.

We recognize that in some instances, a candidate's name may not match the name printed on their formal identification. BGCA supports all youth and is committed to providing an affirming and inclusive experience for everyone. Candidates will be able to participate in all Youth of the Year activities, using the name they identify with, regardless of whether it matches the name on their ID. Headshot

The candidate's headshot must be a professional, high-resolution (300 dpi or 3.5 MB) headshot in front of a clean background with the candidate dressed in business or campus casual attire. A school photo is a great example. The headshot will be uploaded to the YOY online application portal and will be used for event collateral. To learn more, visit the FAQ section of <u>NYOY.org</u>.

Alumni & Friends Enrollment – Juniors & Seniors

All candidates who are juniors or seniors in high school must register for the Alumni & Friends Club at <u>BGCA.org/alumni</u>. (Be sure they select your Club when registering.) This form found in this kit will be uploaded into the YOY online application portal.

RESUME INSTRUCTIONS

Use these instructions, sample resume and resume template to create a resume that shows your qualifications for the role of National Youth of the Year. Upload your resume to the YOY online application portal. Note: Please do not include personal identifying information (e.g., home address, email or phone number) in your resume. Using this template is not mandatory; it is provided as an example. If you choose to use the template, be sure to thoroughly review your content spacing.

The resume is your most important tool when applying for a job. It is a marketing device and acts as your first impression on paper, so take your time to construct it well. Your resume needs to highlight how you meet the necessary:

- Job requirements
- Qualifications and education
- Experience and skills
- Professionalism for the job

Always tailor your resume to any job for which you apply. In this case, please complete the Youth of the Year Candidate Resume Template with your goal to be Youth of the Year in mind.

Resume Introduction

As a Youth of the Year candidate, your goal is to serve as a leader and representative of Boys & Girls Clubs of America and youth across the country. Your resume should include specific characteristics that you believe define your leadership philosophy.

Review the following leadership characteristics and select the three that best represent your leadership style, or you may also come up with your own.

- Problem Solver: When I notice a problem or challenge, I look for and suggest possible solutions.
- **Mentor:** I provide guidance and support and am a role model for others.
- Advocate: I speak up for myself and/or others to support a cause or purpose I believe in.

- **Project Leader:** I lead myself and/or others to complete a project.
- **Evaluator:** I take the time to reflect and gather information before and after making a decision.
- Collaborator: I work respectfully with peers and adults to share responsibilities and accomplish goals.
- **Convener:** I bring people together who have different ideas and experiences to accomplish a purpose.
- Creative Thinker: I think of new and innovative ideas.
- Effective Speaker: I confidently and clearly express thoughts, feelings, and ideas.
- Effective Listener: I listen without judging, assuming or interrupting.
- **Decision Maker:** I can make and express a decision that moves work or ideas forward, even if it might be an unpopular one.
- **Continuous Learner:** I continuously look for opportunities to learn about myself, others, and the world around me.
- Self-Motivator: I believe in and encourage myself to keep going when faced with a challenge.
- Motivator of Others: I encourage others to believe in themselves and keep going when faced with a challenge.
- Initiator: I am a self-starter who takes action when I see a need.
- **Time Manager:** I effectively manage time to accomplish goals.
- **Community Builder:** I help others feel safe, included and connected to each other.
- Inspirer: I spark interest, excitement and action in others.
- **Coordinator:** I can responsibly manage resources and organize and plan activities.
- Visionary: I have and can share a vision for a brighter future and/or outcome.

After you have selected your three leadership characteristics, incorporate these into the Youth of the Year Candidate Resume Template.



Professional Experience

When providing your professional experience, start by listing your most recent leadership experience first and work backward from there. Give the position titles you held and the dates you worked in each position.

Your examples should demonstrate your experience as a leader. These might include:

- Leadership roles you've held at the Club (e.g., Keystone President)
- Leadership roles you've held in school (e.g., Assistant Coach for Swim Team)
- Internships or volunteer work you've done (e.g., Coordinator for Community Food Drive)

For each leadership role you include, list up to three responsibilities you had while in that role and significant contributions you made. Make sure these responsibilities and contributions match the leadership characteristics you selected earlier on your resume. If you had more than three responsibilities and contributions, choose the three that best represent your leadership characteristics.

Awards

Highlighting specific awards or recognition you received is another way to show your leadership capabilities and qualifications. These may include awards you received in the Club, your school or through your community engagement and service.

Certifications



Once your drafts are complete, copy/paste your final copy directly into the YOY online application portal. Each essay has a limit of 5,000 characters, including spaces. (This is roughly the equivalent of a two-page document typed in 11-point Times New Roman font with 1.5 line spacing.)

Essay 1: My Club Experience

Explain why you come to the Club and how it has impacted your life.

Consider the following prompts:

- Describe the skills you have developed and strengthened (e.g., self-awareness, communication, goal setting).
- Describe activities you have participated in or roles you filled.
- Describe a supportive relationship with a peer or adult at the Club.
- Describe examples of your participation in Club community engagement efforts (e.g., campaigns, presentations, service-learning projects).

Essay 2: What Matters to Me

A great foundation for leadership begins with identifying interests, passions and issues that are important to you. Actions and daily practices shaped by these things help you to be an advocate in your Club or community. For example, if you are passionate about the environment, you practice and advocate for recycling in your Club or home.

Consider the following prompts:

- What sparks your interest or passion?
- What is an issue that is important to you?
- Describe an interest or passion that you have put into action or plan to put into action in the future.

Essay 3: Personal Growth

This topic is taken directly from the Common Application essay prompts. The Common Application is a platform used by many colleges. RECOMMENDATION INSTRUCTIONS





- Youth of the Year candidates must always dress appropriately, as requested by BGCA. Please refer to dress code guidelines at <u>BGCA.net/page/YOY</u>.
- Youth of the Year candidates may not use props, notes or memory aids (electronic or physical) during inperson or virtual events, on or off camera unless the device is needed to accommodate a disability.
- If an advisor wants to meet with their candidate and/or practice their speech, the meeting must take place in a public space. If an advisor is only able to connect with their candidate virtually, they must ensure another person is physically present or otherwise able to monitor the candidate and advisor per BGCA's safety guidelines.
